The vacuum pump

Vacuum pumps have a long history and have been commercially available since 1985. A pump consists of a clear plastic cylinder and a pump which may be hand or battery operated. The flaccid penis is placed in the cylinder and an air-tight seal is obtained with a lubricating gel with the plastic cylinder pressed firmly down against the body. A partial vacuum is created by pumping the air out from inside the cylinder.

The penis becomes filled up with blood and, when hard enough for intercourse, a plastic ring is slipped from the end of the cylinder around the base of the penis. This traps blood in the penis and the erection can be safely maintained for up to 30 minutes. Some people prefer to use two constriction rings to obtain a stronger and better maintained erection.

The device is effective for more than 90% of men although it may take up to two weeks for you to learn how to use it properly. When you've got it right, it usually takes two to three minutes for you to get a usable erection. The advantages of a vacuum pump are its relative cheapness and, if it is a good one, its freedom from side effects. In the UK, it is tax free with a doctor's prescription. You occasionally get some bruising but no serious complications have been reported. Don't use it for more than 30 minutes as it can get very uncomfortable. ***It is strongly advised that you buy a pump from a respectable supplier.*** Some firms make a battery operated one. Those bought from a sex shop can be much cheaper but can be unreliable and in some cases, dangerous.

Pumps are particularly useful for men in a stable relationship who can't get an erection for physical reasons and for whom the only alternative would be putting in a penile prosthesis. It is less attractive to single men and for those with psychological erectile dysfunction. A third of the partners noted that the penis felt colder than normal when a pump was used.

Pumps were once considered to be a gimmick when first introduced but are now being used by increasing numbers of men because they are relatively cheap, non invasive, efficient, and allow many couples to have satisfactory intercourse.

Vacuum devices for a small number of men are available on the NHS under Schedule 2 (see below).

Further information

Schedule 2 says that NHS supplies can only be obtained for erectile dysfunction if a man has:

- Diabetes, multiple sclerosis, Parkinson's disease, poliomyelitis, prostate cancer, severe pelvic injury, single gene neurological disease (e.g. Klinefelter's syndrome), spina bifida or spinal cord injury
- Dialysis for renal failure
- Had NHS treatment for impotence before 15 September 1998
- Severe distress as a result of impotence, as diagnosed at a specialist centre.

Note In the UK, the pump can be purchased tax free with a private prescription

Medical suppliers for vacuum devices for women

The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved a device designed to improve female sexual function which is known as the EROS clitoral therapy device (EROS-CTD) and has been made to treat female sexual arousal disorder and is approved for women who experience reduced sensation, lubrication, and ability to achieve orgasm.

Available by prescription only, the device consists of a small vacuum pump that is placed over the clitoris to apply gentle suction to the region and increase blood flow, aiding in sexual arousal.

Of the 15 women who complained of female sexual arousal disorder, all 15 experienced increased sensation, 7 more orgasms, 12 more satisfaction, and 11 more lubrication. Of the 10 normally functioning controls, 4 experienced more sensation, 4 improved orgasm, 2 better satisfaction and 3 more lubrication with the device. No adverse effects were reported from the device.

Treatment with the battery operated vacuum pump is expected to be particularly effective in postmenopausal women and women who have had hysterectomies or experienced surgically induced menopause. The cost is about £250.
